Staff profile: Tatiana Garcia

As you know, we are committed to the personal and professional development of all staff. As part of Meallmore's Nurse Development Programme we signed up to The Nightingale Challenge, which is a worldwide campaign providing leadership and development programmes for nurses. Our "Nightingale Nurses" will be involved in ILM-credited leadership and management courses and policy development projects to further advance their skills.



One of our Nightingale Nurses is Tatiana Garcia, who joined Meallmore in 2019 as a staff nurse at Kynnaird House. Here she shares her reasoning for becoming a nurse and her fascinating work in Colombia:

"Nursing is a career I wanted to pursue since I was young. I grew up in Bogota, Colombia and when I was a teenager I work-shadowed my aunt, who was a chief nurse in the area. During this time, I started to grasp what attributes a good nurse has and these qualities have stayed with me ever since.

"At the start of my career, I was a chief nurse in a conflict zone. I delivered primary care to families who lived rurally and struggled to reach health services. I visited patients either by car, horseback or even on foot, walking for hours through the mountains – all with plenty of medical equipment in a backpack. Nursing duties included everything from family planning and childbirth to vaccinations and emergencies. The area was sometimes dangerous, but it was incredibly rewarding and set me up well for a career in nursing."

In 2008, Tatiana moved to the UK and has lived in Scotland for the last three years. She talks about her career at Meallmore:

"Being a nurse at Kynnaird is very different to being a nurse in Colombia, but it's just as brilliant and rewarding. I love working in a care home as I've really got to know the residents and have built up strong relationships with them. The residents at Kynnaird all have many stories to tell which makes coming to work particularly enjoyable and interesting.

"Since working at Meallmore, I've been able to develop myself professionally, and being part of *The Nightingale Challenge* is one of the ways I am able to do this. At Kynnaird we function incredibly well as a team; working with colleagues really feels like working with friends. I feel well supported and truly appreciated, which gives me the confidence to make the best decisions for our residents."

Christmas competition takes the biscuit

Our homes finished the year with an exciting bake-off competition, putting their best foot forward for the Heilan Hame Gingerbread Challenge. Residents and staff baked and crafted delicious bricks and panels made of gingerbread, allowing residents' imaginations to run wild with ideas.

Memories of a year past

Below we've included an excerpt of a speech delivered by CEO of Scottish Care, Donald Macaskill at a recent virtual conference.

Over the last year the sea has been a place which has reflected the changing moods and experiences which the care home sector has gone through and endured. In a very real sense the sea in its constancy and renewal, its predictability and surprise, its storm and quiet, holds the history of our time.

When some of us gathered in a Glasgow meeting room in February to consider the news reports that were coming through the media about a new virus – a Coronavirus – and how it was affecting parts of China, few us would or could have imagined that we would be beginning a period of time which would occupy and consume our every waking thought and influence our lives in such a profound way.

It is very hard indeed to try to capture in words the experiences of the last ten months. Like the waves of the sea there have been emotions and feelings which have rolled in over us with a constancy which has drained and exhausted. At times there have been waves of fear combined with anxiety, at other emotions of relief and thankfulness. But always - a constancy of the dangerous presence of the virus; a watchfulness for the actions of others and an awareness that focus, and attention was turned inexorably upon our care homes.

It has been a year of strange rhythm ... of loss ... of sadness ... but also of remarkable dedication, sacrifice and strength.

But in the midst of all this negativity, and sadness, of loss



and emptiness... there have been waves of humanity the like of which we have rarely seen.

For right from the start when little was known and fear was suffocating, staff put themselves last and every day went out to care and be at risk; some moved into their care home; every day folks made their way to work even though with the loss of transport even getting there was itself a challenge, and they were present to care, to soothe, to be with.

Every day when the outside clapped for carers, women and men dealt with the absence of family and friend for resident; they were there to connect and make sure contact was maintained, even though workload was enormous.

Every day they were there to read the Guidance, do the training, learn new skills, and work with mask and visor, gloves and gown.

Every day they were present... despite the pain... because of the pain...

They were there – being, loving, caring.

Every day they showed to those with eyes to see and the willingness to listen, that they were the best of us in the worst of times.

So as we come to take a minute when in silence we will piece together our own memories let us together remember all our care homes, and all staff, and all residents, both who have been and who still are...

We remember the tiredness and exhaustion, the weariness which washed over us ...

We remember those whose faces will for ever be etched upon our hearts and souls... people we came to know and name,

We remember the hours we sat and waited, listened and held another in their fear and in the emptying of their life

We remember the hard days and we remember the sparks of laughter

Let us remember...
